Your unwavering support allowed us to be here to meet the growing needs of individuals and families in Lincoln facing homelessness, hunger, addiction, and poverty.

Last year, we provided nearly 250,000 meals through on-site meals and food distributed through the Fresh Choice Pantry – a 59% increase over the past five years. We served an average of 246 onsite meals each day, with staff assisting over 3,000 individuals through more than 55,000 outreach and homeless prevention services.




HUNGER RELIEF

At Matt Talbot, everyone is welcome to walk through our open doors and get a prepared, hot, and nutritious meal two times a day. Guests can also access our on-site Fresh Choice Pantry and choose food items that best meet their needs, including refrigerated items such as meats, dairy, eggs, and produce. People may come to Matt Talbot for food, but they often find community, a sense of belonging, and a space to rebuild their lives along the way.

Volunteers are the backbone of our Hunger Relief program and have been helping us feed the hungry in Lincoln for 32 years and counting.

A TYPICAL DAY IN

Our journey with guests often begins in the dining room where individuals come for a meal or a safe place to stay during the day. Despite their circumstances, guests find a community here.

We offer immediate assistance with basic needs but are here for the long haul, meeting people where they are, offering second chances, and holding on to hope for as long as it takes.



Staff and volunteers set out breakfast items, start the coffee, get shower supplies out, and prepare for the day. Judy schedules a time to take a shower and do a load of laundry. Settling in at a table by the windows to have a cup of coffee while she waits, she notices a volunteer group working in Hope Garden.

While here for dinner, a mom works with a representative from the Food Bank to sign up for SNAP benefits. Many partnering agencies come to Matt Talbot to offer services.

THE MATT TALBOT DINING ROOM



A couple who slept in their car sit down at their usual table after plugging their phones in at the charging station. They will be here most of the day. Jacob, who sleeps in a tent most nights, checks in for his shower appointment. The volunteer gives him the supplies he requests - a towel, washcloth, razor, soap, shampoo & conditioner, toothbrush, and toothpaste.



Volunteers arrive to prepare lunch. Their laughter and conversation can be heard throughout the kitchen. The outreach counter in the dining room opens with 2 or 3 staff members available to answer questions, distribute mail, and provide requested items such as hygiene products, blankets, and socks.



Guests start to form a lunch line which is served cafeteria-style by volunteers from 11:30am–12:30pm. Guests "dine in" or take their meal "to go".

A case manager sees Tom going into the Fresh Choice Pantry, where he will be able to select fresh, refrigerated, and shelf-stable items for his household.





A newly housed client visits the "household pantry" above our garage with her case manager to choose new towels, dishes, comforters, etc. needed for her apartment.

Fred completed a substance use evaluation last week and is on a waiting list to start treatment. He checks in with his counselor, who will drive him to treatment when a spot opens up.





